Each year, we are seeing an increasing impact on residents, patients and caregivers as a result of mental health challenges and the growing use of opioids and narcotics. Our Presenters . . .

Dr. Marcus Greatheart MD, MCFP, MSW, RSW

Dr. Marcus Greatheart brings a unique combination of skills knowledge and training to his work as a family physician in Vancouver, Canada. With over 25 years' experience as a community educator, and a Masters degree in Social Work, he is exceptionally situated to provide care for the most complex patients with medical, mental health and psychosocial issues using strengths-based and trauma-Informed practice. He specializes in addictions, eldercare, LGBT health, and provides hormone and surgical assessment for transgender patients. He is a Clinical Instructor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of British Columbia. His teaching with medical students and Residents focuses on communication skills and wellness in primary care.

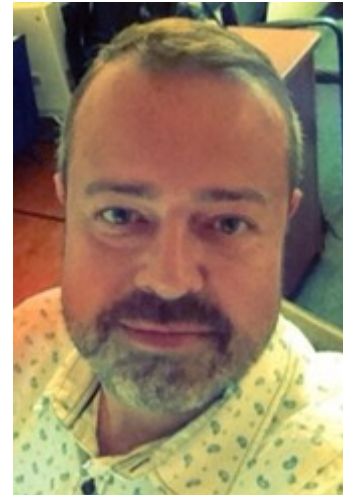


The current opioid epidemic in British Columbia has raised awareness with the public and provoked care providers to advance effective treatments of substance use disorders. This important development means that people with opioid use disorder (OUD) are living longer. However, providing treatments like methadone and buprenorphine/naloxone in a nursing home setting is not yet standard practice and the need for such treatment can be a barrier to placement in long term care facilities. In this presentation, Dr. Marcus Greatheart MD, MSW, discusses the unique challenges faced by LTC residents with OUD, and a pilot project that meets Providence Health Care's mission to serve older British Columbians and people with substance use disorders.

Scott Harrison RN BScN MA CCHNC

Scott is the Director of Urban Health, Indigenous Health, Substance Use, Maternity and NICU for Providence Health Care in Vancouver, BC. Scott is Masters trained in both advanced nursing practice and Cultural Theory and is a Registered Nurse, with experience in both the UK and Canadian health care systems.

He has over 25 years of clinical nursing and leadership experience in HIV/AIDS care, Substance Use, Community Family Health services, child protection and Maternity care. His current role includes strategic management, planning and service delivery in acute, community and primary care settings. Scott is passionate about client and family centred care and has established leading peer initiatives in acute care and teaches provincially and nationally on cultural safety and trauma-informed care.



Since late 2016, the Province of BC has been in the grips of an overdose epidemic due to a toxic drug supply. St Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, is at 'ground zero' of the epidemic, attending to over 70% of all hospitalized overdoses in the city.

In response to the crisis, the Urban Health program, led by Scott Harrison, has created the safeCARE Program: a comprehensive education and support program for staff, to bolster resilience and build skills in working with complex substance use disorders. Built on the organizational values of social justice and compassion and Catholic social teachings on the dignity of human life, the program helps to provide life saving harm reduction and treatment to people who use substances, while supporting staff to deliver these services safely and build their resiliency.

The presentation will provide attendees with concrete examples of evidence-based interventions and how Catholic Health Care continues to be at the forefront of complex health care delivery.

Michael Hryniuk, Ph.D., RP

Michael Hryniuk holds a Doctorate in Theology and Personality Theory from *Emory University* and received his clinical training in psycho-spiritual therapy from the *Toronto Centre for Pastoral Counselling Education*. He has over twenty years of experience in spiritual direction, counselling and therapy with individuals, couples and families. As a therapist in private practice and an Associate of the *Institute of Family Living*, he uses a variety of modalities of healing in a spiritually-integrated approach to counselling and therapy including emotionally-focussed, psycho-dynamic, existential, inter-subjective, transpersonal, and family systems perspectives. His theological training and extensive experience in meditation, spiritual direction and faith development support his clients in drawing on both emotional and spiritual resources in times of struggle, growth, and transition in their lives.



Practitioners in the field of mental health are generally familiar with the important role of spirituality in healing and recovery through Alcoholics Anonymous and other 12 step programs but mainstream clinicians and administrators are only recently attending to other spiritually-integrated perspective approaches to mental health issues. As a clinical psychologist, spiritual director, and Catholic priest, the renowned author Henri Nouwen can offer many unique and valuable perspectives on how to apply spirituality to common mental health concerns such as anxiety, depression, and addiction. In this session, we will re-visit Nouwen's vision of the "Wounded Healer" and extend his insights into the healing process based on his own later struggles with emotional anguish and his experience of a fully spiritual recovery. We will also focus on how these insights can be applied concretely in mainstream clinical practice today.
